Our Mission

SOS promotes housing stability and family self-sufficiency through collaboration, care, and respect.

Together, we have...



Housed 81 families

- 12 families with 17 adults & 43 children stayed at SOS's shelter-homes.
- 81 families with 96 adults & 204 children received rental assistance and case management in the Rapid Rehousing program.
- 89% of families in Rapid Rehousing exited to permanent housing.



Fed 14,391 individuals

- 7,418 households visited SOS's choice food pantry, which offered curbside orders during the pandemic.
- 210,090 pounds of food were distributed.

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Together, we have...



Provided walk-in services to 513 people

- 513 people received transportation or utility assistance, baby food or diapers
- 16,664 diapers distributed
- 378 containers of baby formula/ food distributed
- 896 referrals, including 132 referrals for emergency housing
- 97 households received funds for utility bills, totaling \$88,112



Helped 280 children learn and grow

- 142 families with 280 young children participated in Parents as Teachers, which promotes early childhood learning and health through home visits and groups
- 35 fathers participated in the fatherhood program, which provides parenting support specifically for fathers

Eviction Prevention

- 100 households with 294 people who were at-risk for eviction retained their permanent housing vouchers with the help of SOS's eviction prevention coordinator.
- 22 households with 72 people who were homeless leased up new vouchers and obtained permanent, affordable housing.



COVID Eviction Relief Act (CERA) Program

- 1,535 households including 3,425 adults and children received financial assistance to pay overdue rent and utilities accrued during the pandemic so they could avoid eviction.
